

A MESSAGE FROM THE YOUTH DIRECTOR

This year marked the 15th year that the YMCA of Southwest Nova Scotia has expanded program opportunities for youth. This past year took our Youth Leader Program into Queens County offering youth in Liverpool and the surrounding communities an opportunity to gain valuable leadership skills and volunteer hours. Food security and literacy programs for youth became a focus in 2024, with the expansion of the Cook It Up! program to all three YMCA youth centres through our Youth Outreach Program team. We also partnered with the Blue Jays Foundation and RBC to support youth and their families with healthy meal options. In total, these programs directly impacted over 130 youth who received one-to-one mentorship; supported 25 families; and provided more than 2700 meals.

Our organizations commitment to meeting the needs of our region's rural areas so that all children and youth feel connected and feel a sense of belonging allows us to continually adapt and find innovative solutions while building robust partnerships in the communities we serve. By leading and working with like-minded organizations we will continue to remove the barriers and support individuals wherever they may be on their journey for brighter lives with better physical and mental health. Additionally, in collaboration with community partners, we were successful in leading the initiative for approval for Integrated Youth Services site in Lunenburg County. We look forward to the path ahead and the potential and opportunities 2025 brings.

Free programs for youth, 11-18 years old

KING STREET YMCA YOUTH CENTRE

Programs offered in 2024 include: Cook it up!; Food & Fun; Chill Zone; Board Game Night; and Youth Leader Program. The Youth Centre is a safe space for youth to socialize, make new friends, and participate in a variety of activities.

Accessed: **2,679 times in 2024** and **19,239 times** since opening in October 2012.

2024 saw a **50% increase** in youth accessing programming at the Centre.

SCHEDULED LIMITED PROGRAMS



YOUTH ZONE

Supported by the Province of Nova Scotia, Department of Communities Culture, Tourism, and Heritage, Active Communities Fund, this program provides opportunities for children ages 5-11 years of age to access unstructured physical activities in a non-competitive, healthy, fun, and interactive manner in a safe, social environment.

Accessed: 129 times from January - April & September - December 2024

PARTICIPANT BREAKDOWN

NHL STREET PROGRAM

This new program supported by the Social Impact and Program Innovation branch of the NHL and RCX Sports brings an affordable, fun, simple, and accessible hockey program to youth ages 6-16. Two seasons were held in 2024.

Winter season 2024 - **24 registrants** - 5 teams

Summer season 2024 - **50 registrants** - 8 teams

Additional funding from the *Support4Sport*, the Province of Nova Scotia, Sport Canada, Canada Games Legacy Fund, and Manulife through a Sport Fund Grant allowed for the purchase of NHL Street risers to provide two complete NHL Street Hockey rinks for enhanced participation.

PARTICIPACTION COMMUNITY BETTER TOGETHER CHALLENGE 2024

The YMCA of Southwest Nova Scotia secured funding for the fifth edition of the ParticipACTION Community Challenge, a national physical activity and sport initiative that encourages everyone in Canada to get active throughout the month of June. Several FREE recreational opportunities were held for all ages to participate in and to help contribute active minutes to their respective communities. Together, YMCA members and youth combined to register 10,828 active participants.

The Town of Bridgewater finished as one of the 50 finalists from across Canada.



YOUTH LEADER PROGRAM

Lunenburg and Queens County

Aspiring youth volunteers from Lunenburg & Queens Counties are provided with an opportunity to participate in leadership training, gain developmentally appropriate skills, learn to get along with and appreciate others, gain self-confidence, and volunteer with YMCA led youth programming and community events.

A total of **126 youth** have completed all requirements for Level 1 leadership with **195 certificates** issued to youth attaining a higher level of achievement.

Since 2009 members of the Youth Leader Program have provided more than **20,010 volunteer hours**, with **1090** of those hours in 2024

YOUTH LEADER PROGRAM

Lunenburg and Queens County

— ADDITIONAL HIGHLIGHTS -

- Youth Leader Program launched in Queens County in September 2024 with supportive funding from the Queens County Health Board - Wellness Grant; NS Dept of Education & Early Childhood Development - Out of School Time Grant; and the Health Promoting Schools partnership - After School Program Funding.
- Youth Leaders attended the Community Health Board presentation on the Photovoice Project.
- Youth Leaders partnered with Bridgewater Police Services, Senior Safety Officer, in preparing ribbons for the Senior Safety Day event.
- Seventeen Youth Leaders participated in an Integrated Youth Services focus group on what programs, services, vibe, and design they would like to see in a new centre, resulting in the publication of a report: "YMCA Youth Leaders -- Our Dream Youth Centre."
- Four Youth Leaders from Queens participated in a focus group facilitated by Youth & Caregiver Engagement Coordinator, Mental Health & Addictions Program, IWK Health to gather a summary of youth perspectives on engagements practices. Youth input was summarized in the report: "Youth Engagement: Insights and Recommendations from Youth."

YOUTH-LED PROJECT:

SOUTH SHORE INTERGENERATIONAL CONNECTIONS & CONVERSATIONS

With supportive funding from the Lunenburg County Health Board Wellness Fund, the Youth Leadership Program was successful in launching a new intergenerational project called, "South Shore Intergenerational Connections & Conversations." The project will bridge the gap between youth and seniors in our community by connecting these two generations through food, activities, and discussions ultimately producing an intergenerational podcast series. This project began in October and is led by the YMCA Youth Leaders. The program will be completed in mid-2025.


YOUTH OUTREACH PROGRAM

This all-gender community-based program improves the immediate and long-term social, educational/vocational, economic and health outcomes for vulnerable youth.

The YMCA YOP provides support for the following two streams of youth in Lunenburg & Queens Counties:

General Stream: Youth who are 16-24 years old experiencing risk factors, and who may, or may not be connected to Child Welfare programs.

Youth In Care Stream: Youth 12-19 yrs old in the Minister's care, in a number of settings across the Welfare Placement continuum including temporary and permanent care.









YOUTH OUTREACH PROGRAM

Additional outcomes

YOUTH OUTREACH ONE-TIME FUNDING



In 2024, the YMCA Youth Outreach Programs received a one-time funding support through the Department of Community Services to support programming to address affordable initiatives such as programs to: alleviate poverty; enhance food accessibility; provide additional support services; and promote literacy.

RBC COMMUNITY TOGETHER FUND

Partnering with the RBC Bridgewater Branch, the YMCA of Southwest Nova Scotia was able to provide the youth of Liverpool YMCA Youth Centre a meal cooked and served by three RBC employees. In addition, the Centre was able to use the additional funds provided through the RBC Community Together Grant to help support purchasing groceries for weekly meals provided at the Centre. A total of **298 youth** were directly impacted by this fund.

COOK IT UP! SHOP, COOK & LEARN!

In September 2023, the YMCA of Southwest Nova Scotia received support funding through the Lunenburg County Community Health Board Wellness Grant to provide at-risk youth hands on learning experiences in meal planning, shopping on a budget, food prep following safe practices, and meal preparation using simple ingredients with an emphasis on healthy eating and providing tools transferable to home and community. Additional funds were secured in March 2024 through the Province of Nova Scotia's Department of Communities, Culture, Tourism and Heritage One-Time Food Relief Program with further funds received from South Shore Public Libraries Food Literacy Project; and Nourish Nova Scotia Youth Food Fund. Funding for staffing to provide this program was supported through the Department of Communities Services- Prevention & Intervention Youth Outreach Program and the United Way of Luneburg County. This program was offered in Lunenburg and Queens Counties.

In total, **131 youth** were able to participate directly in the program in 2024, with **2083 meals** prepared by participants for their peers during flexible programs with any leftovers indirectly supporting other youth who accessed space for one-on-one supports. As a result, over **60 youth** were additionally impacted by this project outside of program hours. Funding is ongoing to support this program into 2025.

SPECIAL PROJECT UPDATES

LEAD (LEADERS EXPRESSING & APPRECIATING DIVERSITY) MOVING FORWARD

With support funding through the Nova Scotia Government's Dept of Communities, Culture, Tourism and Heritage, Diversity and Community Capacity Fund and in partnership with the South Shore Regional Centre of Education, the YMCA of Southwest Nova Scotia completed a pilot program with a focus on diversity and social inclusion at New Germany Elementary School. The key activities of this project were to build bridges to promote inter-cultural understanding; promote equal opportunity for individuals of all origins; and foster citizenship, civic engagement, and healthy democracy.

A curriculum for a 16-week program was developed on topics of diversity, leadership, and teamwork. The sessions created for LEAD (Leaders Expressing & Appreciating Diversity) Moving Forward are interactive for facilitation in schools or as community workshops.

WOMENS ENTREPRENEURSHIP STRATEGY (WES)

The YMCA of Southwest Nova Scotia in partnership with YMCA Greater Toronto and funded by DMZ, introduced the Launchpad for Women Entrepreneurs in late 2023. This dynamic program aims to increase women-owned businesses' access to the financing, talent, networks, and expertise they need to start up, scale up and access new markets.

This 18-month project provides support for diverse, intersectional and/or under-served women entrepreneurs. This project will conclude in March 2025.

Targets for funders for Nova Scotia for the duration of the project:

- 66 clients supported in starting a new business
- 16 clients supported in sustaining or growing an existing business

Actual Outcomes for 2024:

- 251 unique clients supported
- 467 Phase 1 workshops completed
- 92 Phase 2 workshops completed
- 297 peer to peer session held
- **1880** individuals contacted through outreach & info sessions

NEW PROJECTS 2024

BLUE JAYS FAMILY NIGHT AT HOME

Family Night at Home is a Blue Jays initiative that aims to bring the magic of play and food into homes of families. The YMCA of Southwest Nova Scotia partnered with the Blue Jays Foundation and ...And Everything Nica Café & Catering Café to create meaningful connections for the families and the communities we serve. Families were selected by the YMCA's community partners. Each family received a delicious home cooked meal from the local restaurant selected by the Blue Jays Foundation and a themed family games and activity pack once a week for three weeks in April 2024.

This Jays Care initiative was able to reach over 350 families nationally, encompassing approximately 1600 individuals. We reached **25** families in Bridgewater with **107** individuals benefitting from this program locally.

PIZZA & PONDER - FOCUS GROUP FOR YOUTH ENGAGEMENT

The Queens Coast Diversity and Inclusion Small Grant Program provided support to host two youth focus groups to discuss recommendations for youth engagement in Queens County. One session was held with the Liverpool Regional High School Gender Sexuality Alliance and one with youth attending the Liverpool YMCA Youth Centre.

Thirty-six youth ages 12 -24 years provided dialogue on what they want to see offered for youth in their community. The results of these discussions were complied and shared with community organizations serving youth in Queens County.



URGENT FOOD AND ESSENTIALS FUND

The YMCA of Southwest Nova Scotia were successful in receiving a one-time grant from the United Way Halifax to provide \$2000 in grocery gift cards to address the most pressing needs for youth impacted by food security. In total **50 youth** were supported with this program.



INTEGRATED YOUTH SERVICES - LUNENBURG COUNTY

Young Nova Scotians and their families will soon have easier access to mental health and addictions services and related supports in Lunenburg County. Integrated Youth Services (IYS) is coordinated by community organizations with oversight from the Provincial Leadership Team, part of the IWK Mental Health & Addictions Program in partnership with several government departments to help youth ages 12-25 through in-person, outreach and virtual services.

In April 2024, Brian Comer, Minister of Addictions and Mental Health, announced the locations of seven of eight of the new Integrated Youth Services sites - each offering multiple supports which can include counselling, peer support, primary healthcare, employment and training supports, recreation, life skills and social services such as housing and income assistance support. The Town of Bridgewater was named a location for one of the new IYS sites.

The IYS - Lunenburg County site will be run by a coalition of community-based organizations, not one single organization. Because of this, entire communities have a strong sense of ownership of their IYS site.

Preliminary work was completed on design, staffing structure, needs assessment, youth and caregiver focus groups, building a Youth Advisory Council and a Care Giver Advisory Council, and building service agency partnerships. Much of the remaining months of 2024 were exploring space of least 7000 square feet that is centrally located and close to transit routes. The goal is to have a site ready to open in 2025.

WORKSHOPS

BASIC BUDGETING FOR YOUTH- TAKING CONTROL OF YOUR MONEY

With supportive funding from: Employment Support & Income Assistance, Youth Development Initiative - Department of Community Services, and NS Dept of Education & Early Childhood Development Out of School Time Grant, and Department of Community Services - Prevention & Intervention Youth Outreach Program the YMCA provided three FREE opportunities for youth, ages 15-25, to better understand finances and empower them with the knowledge to transition into independent living. A total of **30 youth** participated in three workshop opportunities offered in both Lunenburg & Queens Counties.

2024 DIGITAL DISCOVERY CAMP - LUNENBURG COUNTY

The King Street YMCA Youth Centre hosted a FREE 4-day camp in-person experience for **13 youth**. Facilitated by the Discovery Centre in partnership with Digital Nova Scotia, youth explored everything from robotics and coding to 3D printing and video game development.

LET'S TALK CHOICES

This 6-session program is aimed at generating meaningful conversations amongst youth who are part of 2SLGBTQIA+ communities, and their allies. With support from SchoolsPlus this program was offered at Forest Heights Community School and New Germany Regional High School. A total of **39 youth** participated in the program





BOYS GROUP

This 4-session in-school program was designed to meet the needs of a group of grade 6 youth at Centre scoliare de la Rive-Sud. With supportive funds from SchoolsPlus, youth were provided support in positive choices & socialization in a group setting. This program was accessed a total of **41 times.**

LEARNING TO BREATHE

Y-Our Safe Space – Empowering Youth supported by Department of Community Services- Prevention & Intervention Youth Outreach Program offered a 6-session workshop at Bridgewater Junior High School for **9 youth.** Learning to Breathe is a mindfulness program, from a trauma informed approach, which provides youth stress-reduction skills, inspiring compassion and acceptance and encourage and nurture present moment awareness.



WORKSHOPS

ANGER MANAGEMENT



Y Our Safe Space – Empowering Youth with support from Department of Community Services Prevention & Intervention Youth Outreach Program provided workshops on anger management aiming to help youth better understand, navigate, and respond to their emotional responses. The workshop was held at New Germany Regional High School.



ENERGIZE GUYS

Department of Community Services-Prevention & Intervention Youth Outreach Program Staff developed a new program called Energize Guys. Young men (ages 12 – 15 years) participated in skill building activities and recreation to improve their health, and the health of their peers. The program is designed to help guys open and discuss topics such as boundaries, relationships, substance use, and more.

This program was offered four times, once at Bridgewater Junior High School; twice at Bayview Community School; and once at Chester Area Middle School.

In total, **20 youth** have participated in sessions offered in 2024.





IGNITE CONFIDENCE - GIRLS ON FIRE CAMP

Y Our Safe Space - Empowering Youth and Liverpool YMCA Youth Centre with support from Department of Community Services-Prevention & Intervention Youth Outreach Program offered a new program called Girls on Fire. Designed to help girls, teens, and young women (female identified youth ages 12 – 18) learn lifelong strategies for empowerment, self-care, promote self-worth, confidence, and resilience, while recognizing the infinite potential that lies within. Two 4day camps were held in the summer; one in Lunenburg County & one in Queens County. An additional 16 sessions in-school program began in the fall at Hebbville Academy and will conclude in 2025.

In total, **13 youth** have participated in sessions offered in 2024.
